AAEA LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

Last year, the American Agricultural Editors' Association reinstituted the Lifetime Achievement Award, which had been given for the first and only time in 1990 to Wheeler McMillen. The AAEA presented five Lifetime Achievement awards in 2007, to Wilson Carnes, Bob Rupp, Charlie Scruggs, Jim Thomson and Cordell Tindall.

The two recipients for 2008 were selected by the AAEA Service Awards Committee. These awards are sponsored by The Sonja Hillgren Foundation.

CLAUDE GIFFORD

Born in Illinois and educated in Iowa, Claude Gifford had a distinguished academic career at Muscatine Junior College and Iowa State University. After service as a B-26 Marauder pilot and flight instructor in World War II, Gifford began a period of more than 20 years as economics and farm policy editor of *Farm Journal* and associated publications.

Gifford was co-author of the original American Agricultural Editors' Association code of ethics. In 1967, he started the AAEA Communications Clinic, the forerunner of today's Agricultural Media Summit. He was president of AAEA in 1967-68.

In 1971, Gifford's began a 23-year career as director of information for USDA. From Washington, he managed a communications operation with more than 1,300 specialists who published more than 50 million copies of publications annually. He retired in 1994 with senior executive service status. Today he resides in Muscatine, Iowa.

LARRY HARPER

Born in Butler, Mo., Larry Harper began his career with *Missouri Ruralist* soon after his graduation in agricultural journalism from the University of Missouri, where he made the All-American Rifle Team. Harper became editor of *Missouri Ruralist* in 1976. He was a tireless voice for agriculture in his state. Larry died in May of 2005.

Harper is best known in the American Agricultural Editors' Association for bridging the gap between young members and old through his organization of what became known as the "Flame Conference" held at a lodge near the Lake of the Ozarks in 1984. It proved to be a turning point in how the organization would be shaped, including the development of the AAEA Professional Improvement Foundation (PIF).

Harper believed that AAEA's best purpose was in training and professional development. To that end, he worked to create a series of photo workshops that attendees say were among the most intense and educational they'd ever attended.

AAEA DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

DR. DWAYNE BECK MANAGER, DAKOTA LAKES RESEARCH FARM, PIERRE, SD

Dwayne Beck has developed no-till farming practices that have helped producers in the Great Plains of the U.S. and other countries to farm in a more profitable and environmentally friendly fashion.

Because of his research and educational outreach, countless farmers on the Great Plains have moved from their traditional wheatsummer fallow rotations into diversified rotations that involve more crops and eliminate the fallow year, while producing greater profits, eliminating wind erosion and improving soil quality. His mantra, "Let the farm work for you," echoes in the minds of producers, reminding them of the power they hold to change the way they do business.

Showcasing this reminder is the Dakota Lakes Research Farm, an 840-acre site that is a cooperative effort between South Dakota State University and the Dakota Lakes Research Farm Corporation, a not-for-profit corporation established by area farmers. This group owns the land, buildings, and other fixed assets. The production enterprise is managed so that the research program is optimized with the goal to make as much money as possible and return those funds on further research projects, facility improvements, and equipment purchases and upgrades.

AAEA has named a Distinguished Service Award recipient each year since 1947. This award is sponsored by Archer Daniels Midland.

ANDY MARKWART HORIZON AWARD

The Andy Markwart Horizon Award, presented by the AAEA Professional Improvement Foundation (PIF) and John Deere in a matching grant partnership, is a new annual award given to an AAEA member who embodies the youthful vigor, energy, passion, dedication and creativity shown by Andy in his volunteer work for AAEA for many years. Andy, editor of *The Furrow*, died in 2005 from heart problems.

Each year the winner of the award will receive a \$2,500 stipend, which can be used for attending the International Federation of Agricultural Journalists (IFAJ) annual meeting, the AMS meeting or a special class/seminar/workshop the recipient proposes and is approved by PIF.

The first-ever winner, in 2007, was Jamie Cole, managing editor of *The Progressive Farmer* magazine, from Maylene, Ala. This year's winner will be announced at the 10th Anniversary AMS Celebration and Joint Awards Ceremony on July 29.

AAEA/ACT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

My dad was a full-time farmer from the age of 16 until he died at 75. The only thing he loved more than the land and livestock was seeing his family succeed. Denied anything more than an 8th grade education himself by tragedies of the Depression, he was incredibly pleased and proud when his kids reached for higher learning. You could engage him in an all-day discussion by bringing up Hereford cattle (the horned kind, there was something wrong with cattle that didn't grow horns), or Lynks seed corn, for which he was a master dealer. My mom was a gentle farm homemaker who never missed a parent-teacher conference or a Christmas concert, and made sure the homework was always done on time. She had a natural curiosity about new things and people, and she instilled this into her five children. It has served me well in my career. Mom seldom drove a tractor and never sorted hogs, but she was legendary in her family as a chicken butcher. When she put on her head scarf, butchering apron, and the belt that held the knives, this petite woman became a killing machine, and her grandkids took to calling her "Grambo." She didn't know what they were talking about, but she loved their attention.
